

WHY LENT?

complete.

Why do we need a Lenten season? Lent is a super important time to return to the Father. Like Advent, it calls us back to the story of salvation that has to become our own. Advent brings us back to the glory of Christmas as the Word is made flesh and the fulfillment of God's promise for the Messiah is

Lent brings the mission of salvation right before us through the gift of Easter and transfers the responsibility of sharing the story and life of the Risen Christ for each of us in our homes, workplaces and the world. Lent draws us close to the passion, death and resurrection of Christ, not simply in historical terms, but brings it alive in us again and again so that we can be true messengers of glory in our day to day lives. For us to be true disciples of the Risen Lord, we need to truly seek transformation, renewal and change so that Easter is not simply a season we mark liturgically, but one that we embody in our actions and sacrifices. We need to experience the love, healing and new life of Christ that so overwhelms us we cannot help but share that joy and light with others. How can this really happen?

A GLIMPSE OF GRACE

This past week I experienced something that I initially thought was a sign of normalcy, but in fact it was a true sign of grace.

Fr. Saleem and I have had the great privilege of hearing First Reconciliations of our young people who have already completed three weeks of preparation. On one particular evening of celebrations, we had a few things happening at the parish—I have not seen so much activity in over a year—and it

was wonderful to see!!

We had about 20 First Reconciliation candidates come over the span of ninety minutes (socially distanced and safe thanks to our amazing

volunteers) while also having a small choir group

something that was normal for the parish—something that we have all longed for and hopefully soon can return to. Things were busy and in the midst of it all, people were thankful for the opportunity to experience grace and healing through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Following the confessions and after the choir left and once again everything was silent, I sat back and thought—what a moment of grace that was, to see anew the glory, power and hope of the Holy Spirit!! My heart was filled with gratitude because the night reminded me that God is the only one who can fill our hearts!! I saw it in the faces of the young people who received First Reconciliation, the parents who introduced their candidate by sharing at least one gift their child has, to the gratitude of each candidate and family that attend the First Reconciliation. This was not just a glimpse of getting back to normal but a true glimpse of grace. The gift and act of faith fills us up and overflows our hearts!!

HEART HEALTH

Lent is a time for us to allow the Lord to fill our hearts. This takes time, patience and an openness and attentiveness to grace. We have to seek out those opportunities of prayer, sacrifice and service for the sake of others and the Good News so that we and those around us can truly see tangible signs of the Lord's presence. The more we do this the greater the effect for all of us. But in this, we need to allow God's grace to

touch our hearts. How can we be sure to welcome Christ's love and grace into our hearts this Lent as we are getting closer and closer to Easter?

(1) REMOVE BARRIERS

What in our lives right now take us away from God's grace or blocks the opportunities for God to support us? Often times these are subtle, unseen barriers to God. We may not dedicate enough time to prayer or we can be too distracted with other things. We may be just way too busy to spend some time allowing Christ to be with us. Maybe we are afraid or don't know where to start. Please remember, the parish staff is always ready to help!! Every barrier can be removed with the help of others!!

(2) EXPLORE NEW THINGS

When trying to change habits we often need to try new things. Pick up your Bible or check out the daily readings which you can access via our parish website. Explore our RETREATS & PRAYERS section for different ways to pray and reflect or visit FORMED.ORG and see the variety of ways you can pray, learn and deepen your faith. When we search for Christ we will always find Him. When we find Him our lives are made new!!

(3) SACRAMENT OF PEACE

I have often mentioned this in my reflections during Lent but I cannot help it. God's grace is powerful and the fastest way God can transform and fill our hearts is through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We are offering General Absolution before each weekend Mass during Lent and have individual reconciliation on Wednesday nights. This sacrament removes barriers, offers healing and fills our hearts. What a gift of grace!!

HOW IS GOD FILLING YOUR HEART?

Take some time this week and find out how God is filling you up with His love and grace? If there are areas that need conversion or healing—ask the Lord for help. If there are barriers too heavy to remove yourself, seek God's grace in the sacraments or ask for help. We are in this journey together and as one family we will renew our hearts!!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Healthcare professionals need our prayers and support. Parliament has passed Bill C-7 and expanded access to assisted suicide across Canada. People with disabilities, those with mental illness and those with chronic conditions will qualify, even if they are not dying. This law will put vulnerable people at risk.

The federal legislation will have implications for healthcare in the provinces. Now, more than ever, we need doctors, nurses and other healthcare professionals who will ensure vulnerable patients have caring alternatives to lethal injections. But many healthcare professionals with moral convictions are being pushed out of their profession by provincial health regulators. Here in Ontario, you can support vulnerable patients by contacting the Ontario government and asking that legislation be introduced to protect the conscience rights of healthcare workers.

I invite you to visit www.canadiansforconscience.ca/ontario where you can send an email directly to the Ontario government and learn more about this critically important issue. If your MPP is Conservative it will be sent to him or her, and if you are represented by an MPP of another party it will be sent to the Premier and the Health Minister. No one should ever be forced to participate by immoral means, for example, by making an effective referral, in ending the lives of patients. We need legislation in Ontario to protect the conscience rights of healthcare workers.

Let us continue to pray for those who are sick, vulnerable and alone. Thank you for all that you do to strengthen our faith community, especially during these challenging times.

March 19, 2021 The Solemnity of Saint Joseph

To: The Faithful of the Diocese of London

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Pope Francis has announced that during 2021 the Church will observe a Year of Saint Joseph to mark the 150th anniversary of the saint's proclamation as Patron of the Universal Church.

Saint Joseph is a figure well-known to Catholics. His name has been attached to churches throughout the world, including six at present in our own diocese, as well as to schools and health care facilities. In addition to being the Patron of the Universal Church, Saint Joseph has been designated as the Patron of Canada and the Patron of Workers. He has been invoked in connection to a number of intentions, notably as the patron of a happy death.

Remarkably, this reverence for this central figure in the canon of saints and the invocation of his intercession in so many instances is for a man about whom we know very little in terms of the details of his life. He is mentioned in the infancy narratives in both the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Yet nothing of what he said during these episodes in the early life of Jesus is even recorded. All that is given us in these accounts tells of an ordinary working man from the town of Nazareth who is clearly a person of righteousness and of compassion and, particularly, a man of faith, who was open to God's will for him and who was willing to believe, to trust, that the events that overtook him were, somehow, a part of God's overall plan.

Saint Joseph was a man who listened for God's voice in his life and who sought to respond to it as fully as possible even when it was difficult and demanding, requiring him to set aside his own hopes and dreams. Perhaps in what we see of Saint Joseph in the Gospels, it is this fact that stands out most of all: that he let go of his plans, his expectations for himself and his future in order to serve the Lord.

The path set out for him entailed being a stranger among strangers when the promised child was born; of being hunted by a tyrant and fleeing from his homeland, living as a refugee in a foreign country with the poverty and insecurity that occasioned; and of eventually returning home to pick up the pieces of his life. And throughout all these trials, there was the constant and anxious concern for the child and its mother entrusted to his care and protection.

The story of Saint Joseph echoes the lives of so many believers throughout the ages. It is for this reason, I believe, that the commemoration of Saint Joseph in this moment when we and the entire world are struggling through a pandemic that has caused untold distress, sickness and death is especially apt. At a time when the threat of a deadly virus has caused millions to live away, alone and in isolation, Saint Joseph is the model of a hidden life endured in confidence and hope. In a global event that has brought about immense suffering and loss, Saint Joseph is a figure who has likewise shared in the pain and loss so many are experiencing. And in the unseen death of Saint Joseph in the years before Jesus' public ministry, and the sorrow it undoubtedly provoked in Mary and the young Jesus, we have a link to the grief of multitudes of families who have lost loved ones to COVID-19, often away or at a distance from them. In a mysterious yet, nevertheless, unique way, Saint Joseph may also be the unofficial, the undeclared "patron of a struggling humanity in the present time".

In these days when we are unsure of what may come next, or where what is happening will lead, or, most importantly, where God is to be found in the tumultuous events we are presently living, we have the example of Saint Joseph and his humble, unfailing trust in the Lord's goodness, care and compassion for all his people.





STEP FOUR:

Listen to the celebration with your phone or cell phone. If you have the "speaker" feature on your phone, you can listen hands free. Enjoy the celebration.

Do I live in a way which is moderate and balanced through what I eat and drink?


Do I tend to the needs of my body with proper exercise and good living?
